It's a delight to pen a few thoughts for "Savera" on the 88th foundation day of our Congregation, on the theme 'Relationships: Love in action' based on the Pastoral year's (2023-2024) theme: "You also should do as I have done to you" (Jn.13:15).

Building Strong Parent-Child Relationships

'The Hands That Rocks the Cradle Rules the World' - this often quoted proverb underlines parents' influence on a child, on the institution of family and on the human civilisation at large.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church says, "The family is the original cell of social life. It is the natural society in which husband and wife are called to give themselves in love and in the gift of life. Authority, stability and life of relationships within the family constitute the foundations for freedom, security and fraternity within society". Therefore parenting is one of the most rewarding and challenging responsibilities. It is a long journey that requires courage, determination and patience; for parents are the ultimate role models for their children. Every spoken word, every movement they make and every action shapes the future of the child. No other person or outside force has greater influence on a child than a parent.



When it comes to family life, everyone strives to figure out how the relationship between parents and children can become ideal. Positive parenting techniques work well for raising children with discipline and good moral values, and are every parent's dream. However, it is not an easy feat. It is important to know that the parent-child relationship is a two-way street, in other words, it is actually a partnership between a parent and their child. Says James E. Faust "To be a good father and mother requires that the parents defer many of their own needs of their own desires in favour of the needs of their children. As a consequence of this sacrifice, conscientious parents develop a nobility of character and learn to put into practice the selfless truths taught by the Saviour Himself". This is best exemplified in the lives of the Holy Family of Nazareth.

God sent His Son into the world in a family which had its hearts open to love; that had its doors open to love. Christ chose to be born and grow up in the bosom of the holy family of Joseph and Mary; it is here that he advanced in wisdom and age and in favour before God and man (*Lk 2, 52*). The Boy Jesus in the Temple (*Lk 41-52*) presents before us the many facets of life this holy family faced. It was a close-knit family bound with strong filial relationships with each other. They were faithful to God and the Jewish faith. Joseph and Mary were faithful to each other and in love. They loved their son dearly yet they gave Him freedom to walk through the journey with their relatives and neighbours (or so they thought He would be with them). It shows that they had strong relationships with their family and neighbours or who else would trust their son to the neighbours? But they found out that Jesus was not with them and acknowledging their responsibility they set out on their way back to Jerusalem, to search for him at that very night.

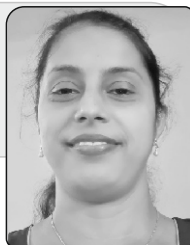
When they find Jesus, Mary expects Jesus to behave in a certain way but Jesus responds to her differently that is, he has to be in His Father's house doing His Father's will. Although Mary and Joseph did not understand what He said yet He went with them to Nazareth as an obedient child. As parents we too may face situations of confrontations with our children, but Jesus shows us the way to do things as He did, that is to show understanding and faith in each other.

In the document "*Amoris Laetitia*", on love in the family, Pope Francis wrote, "No family drops down from heaven perfectly formed, families need constantly to grow and mature in the ability to love". Therefore it is important to realise that effective parenting is actually the result of a collective contribution of each parent. Both, the father and the mother have a crucial role to play if they want to raise an individual who merit the worth of values that will establish a sense of belonging and facilitate an environment that inspires youngsters to be more humane, responsible and confident to face the world. And when the waters turn stormy the child is sure that he has his support system to fall back to.

St Paul's letter to the Colossians says, "and above all virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity". So as we guide our children let us strive first of all to grow in love of God and man and all goodness will follow us. I will conclude with the words of St Teresa of Kolkota, "*love begins by taking care of the closest ones - the once at home*".

Values guide us towards healthy development of positive relationships.

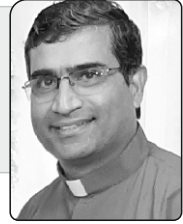
Values help us live with direction and purpose – like a guiding compass. Whatever is going on in our lives, our values can show us a path forward, and help us make better choices.

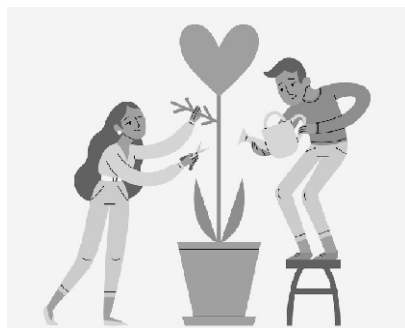
LOVE IN ACTION: CULTIVATING HEALTHY RELATIONSHIPS

There’s an important pattern in Mary’s life that’s meant to set the course of every Christian life: She received the Word of God, nurtured His life in her flesh and brought Him forth for the salvation of the world. If we’re going to nurture relationships then it’s important for us to think about how we can receive, nurture and bring forth the life of Christ in our own lives.

In quiet prayer, for example, we allow the Holy Spirit to overshadow our own hearts and minds. In the Eucharist, we receive the Body of Christ into our own flesh. In prayer with Scripture, we nurture the life of Christ in our minds and imaginations. In acts of service, we meet and serve Christ in others. In all the daily tasks of family life and work we can model our life on Mary: receiving, nurturing and bringing forth the life of Jesus.

Of course, the pattern called for Mary’s consent – it wasn’t something that just happened to her - and the same is true of us. We can receive Him, or refuse Him. We can nurture His life within us, or stunt its growth. We can bring Him forth for others, or keep Him to ourselves.

Mary was granted purity from the moment of her conception: then, with God’s grace, she preserved that purity her whole life through. Her purity led to the power of her consent, and the power of her consent led to the depth of her influence on the course of salvation history. We, on the other hand, need to rise to that purity by cooperating with the grace that God gives to us. As we grow in purity, the power of our consent grows. And as the power of our consent grows, we will enjoy ever deeper influence on the lives of those we encounter.

SERVANT LEADERS: GUIDING WITH COMPASSION

Deriving the word leader from Hebrew 'Nagiyd' it literally means a person under an authority who fulfills the wishes of that authority. Often termed as a Servant Leader, Jesus, was under the authority of God the Father, fulfilling His will of bringing mankind out of the clutches of sins. Even though being the Son of God Jesus did obey The Authority of his Father thus setting an example to each of us to be obedient and not to have one's own ways. A true exemplary to the modern day leaders who have taken care of their own interests thus forgetting their responsibility of a true leader.

Biblically one can say Mosesⁱⁱ was the first to be a servant leader who fulfilled the will of YAHWEH. - **Potential over perfection**

The disciples that Jesus chose, whom He would form into leaders ahead, instead of the pious men, were simple laborers, tax collectors, fisherman mostly sinners in whom he saw the potential of saints. Jesus worked from the roots, so that they could bear fruits.

- **Forgiveness over grudge**

Jesus knew Judas would betray him, yet he washed his feet. Jesus forgave him even before he was forsaken. Peter denied Jesus thrice yet Jesus forgave him and gave him the keys to heaven. Being a leader he was targeted, yet he forgave.

- **To Serve' over 'being served**

Being a leader he washed the feet of his disciples, an uncommon practice for a leader in Jesus' time wherein, not even the servants,

but the slaves washed the feet of their masters. And thus gave us one of the greatest principles of his life 'to serve and not to be served.'^{iv}

- **Seek over content**

Jesus thought his disciples never to be content with the knowledge that they had. He asked them questions and made them think. When he was questioned, he reversed it on them and made them answer their own question. He was never content with things around him. He sought and taught others to do the same.

- **Mercy over judgment**

Jesus chose Mercy over judgment. He came so that mankind would taste the mercy of the father. A true leader who imparted grace yet the same time sent them with accountability. He forgave the sins of the adulterous woman yet sent her saying "sin no more"^v

It is indeed important that leaders imbibe such qualities if they indeed want to serve the people. It is easy to make promises at the time of elections, but difficult to fulfill those promises once in power. The attitude of "I am the Boss" needs to change to "I am a servant" no one is the boss except the Creator who runs the entire universe. A servant leader always aims in rendering service and not enjoying the service of others.

If our leaders are indeed servant leaders, it's high time it hits their realization that moving in an air conditioned vehicle, making the common man wait in the scorching sun isn't servant leadership. Felicitating and gaining publicity in one's achievement and deserting in one's need isn't servant leadership. Destroying the nature in the name of development isn't servant leadership. Servant leadership is when one realizes that God is the sole authority and he/she is bound by His authority, to follow his will in bringing about the good, the good with which he created the world and intends to run it with the same. A servant leader imparts love through his actions, guides with compassion, keeping no room for hatred and disharmony.

Congregation of the Holy Family of Nazareth, the S.F.N sisters from Goa launched into North India at Noida (U.P) on 24th June 2017 to work in collaboration with Rev. Fr. Jose Alarico Carvalho, a member of the Society of Pilar. Our then Superior General, Sr. Alvita, undertook this mission in Noida. The first two sisters worked in this field of social work, along with academics and hostel.

Agnel Jan Kalyan Kendra is a social outreach project of Fr. Agnel School Noida and has been actively working for the community since year 2014. Agnel Jan Kalyan Kendra under one umbrella is training the students in different verticals like cutting- tailoring, beauty culture, computers, spoken English and music. These skilled courses are followed by placement. Every 45days 100 candidates are placed in garment industry and IT.

Besides this on daily basis about 100 children from the slum area who are born and brought up in the garbage dumps are brought to the center. Our motive behind bringing them is to change their mindset from the garbage picking towards education which transforms their lives. Here at the center we clean them, educate them, feed them



and reach they safely back to their place. We regularly go to the slums, organize different competitions and health camps that help us to build a good rapport with the people, especially women. We help them every month by giving them ration, wherein the families are satisfied and happy. Through our regular visits to the parents and families of our academic students, we try to provide an overall support in terms of health, education, skillset, coaching for various government jobs through Sarkari Pariksha.

By our Jan Sewa Kendra we have been helping the community with the benefits of pensions for the elderly, disabled and widows. They are also benefited with the services of Aadhar Card, Pan Card, Ration card, Income Certificate etc. All our staff goes for the mobilization after the school is over.

Today by working for the poor and the needy, I find **a joy within myself**. I also find happiness and able to experience lots of love and feel the presence of my lord in the marginalized people at all times.

AN ACT OF LOVE IN ACTION

I was elated to celebrate a real-life story of the good Samaritan, an act of love in action. It was Easter Monday, with the sun glaring at a temperature of over 35 degrees Celsius, when something unusual happened. One of our sisters, Sr. Phileshin De Souza, told us about it. She works for the uplift of people living in poverty in the slums area of Birla-Zuari Nagar, Sancoale, at Kiran Niketan Social Service Centre, a 10-kilometer drive from the Dabolim Airport in Goa.

Sister Phileshin is a member of the Congregation of the Sisters of Holy Family of Nazareth, Sancoale-Goa. A social worker, born in Karnataka, she has many awards for giving life to the lifeless and neglected ones, and leaving indelible footprints in the lives of many — be they migrant workers, women, youth, girls and children (for whom she even had risked her life during the COVID-19 pandemic).

On that Easter Monday, April 10, Sister Phileshin was celebrating her gift of life - a life of seeking justice for the anawim of society - when she came across a grave situation.

Early the next day, I spotted her on our campus and was glad to see her since I couldn't be there for her birthday. I asked her to meet me before she left, as I needed some information about the recent medical camp held for the migrants.

She told me a heart-rending story. I said, "Wow!", and was glad I got to visit with her. She said that she remembered the good Samaritan parable when she passed by the airport road.

"Sister, in the scourging heat I saw a youth fallen in the roadside gutters. Many people passed that way. Not only people but the number of vehicles, four-wheelers, two-wheelers, carrier trucks moving to and



fro on the busy road. My heart was moved and I was filled with compassion. Though I had to reach for the appointment, the scene of the man going from Jerusalem to Jericho attacked on the road came to my mind. How could I leave him in that state? I was disturbed and remembered the words of Jesus, 'Go and do likewise.'"

She went on to say that many had seen him, yet they passed by. She parked her bike at the side of the road to go see him. She couldn't tell whether he was alive.

So she called the police — who took some time to arrive — but they found that the boy was alive. They were not kind but, on the contrary, smacked him as Sister Phileshin kept asking them to take him to a hospital. They would not, and made her call the ambulance to take him to the hospital.

When the ambulance arrived, the driver knew the boy, as he was from the same locality, and called the owners of the house he rented while the boy was being taken to the nearby Health Centre and admitted. The case was registered in the name of Sister Phileshin, to admit the youth and to give him further medication.

Sister said that her day was done, and felt peaceful. She said it was the best and most memorable gift for her birthday, to treasure and share with many to inspire and enlighten and motivate.

Yes, like the wounded man going from Jerusalem to Jericho, attacked by the robbers, the youth while returning from his job was robbed of his treasured belongings — his money and his mobile — and left to die in the gutter.

The youth robbed of his belongings is an example of what is still happening in today's society, and illustrates how we need to reach out and bandage their wounds and take care.

"Today, even after 2,000 years," Sister said, "We still have the parable of the Good Samaritan [Luke 10: 29-37], taking place on the roadsides and happening in many places elsewhere."

These little works give me immense joy, to see my sisters in places where we work all over India, fulfilling the saying of our founder — *Love the poor; do not hurt them* — and taking care of those living on the peripheries. And fulfilling the words of Jesus: *Whatever you do to the least of these little ones you did it for me* (Matthew 25:40) moreover set an example of love in action.
