Youth BRIDGING THE FAITH GAP: REACHING YOUNGER GENERATIONS IN A CHANGING WORLD

"What is needed today is a church which knows how to respond to the expectations of young people. Jesus wants to enter into dialogue with them and, through his body, which is the church, to propose the possibility of a choice, which will require a commitment of their lives. As Jesus with the disciples of Emmaus, so the church must become the traveling companion of young people..." (Pope John Paul II)

In a rapidly changing world, people are questioning traditional beliefs, including religion. Younger generations, raised in a vastly different environment than their parents,

are particularly unsure. This begs the question: can the Catholic faith still provide solace and purpose in a constantly evolving world? This essay will delve into how different age groups view religion and how core Catholic principles offer hope and direction for all.

According to Pew



Research, there is a noticeable trend of scepticism and declining religious affiliation among younger generations. A recent study (January 2024) indicated a shocking trend in the US: religious unaffiliation is now the most common religious identity in the country. A similar trend is growing in most European countries and Canada.

To know and understand younger generations, it will be ideal to analyse the unique characteristics of each generation and their general attitudes towards religion.

Gen X (1965-1980): Tech-savvy and independent, their religious involvement varies. While some are religious, fewer attend church regularly compared to older generations.

Millennials (1981-1996): Digital natives who grew up with social media, they are considerably less religious than their parents' generation. Religion is less likely to be very important in their lives.

Gen Z (1997-2012): True digital natives with strong information access, Gen Z shows a significant decline in religious affiliation. They are less likely to believe in a higher power and identify as non-religious or non-spiritual.

Gen Alpha (2010-2025): Growing up with technology and often raised in nominally Christian families, Gen Alpha might be less familiar with strong biblical teachings. However, their digital exposure could lead them towards personalized spiritual beliefs based on their own values.

Pope Francis has been engaging in conversations with young adults from various backgrounds and recognizes a gap in understanding younger generations.

To bridge this gap, it very essential to know the Youth and their world and to guide them. As youth ministers, the following steps might help -

Love Youth: Show genuine interest in young people's needs, dreams, and challenges. This love translates into actions that support their growth.

Be Near Them: Build relationships with young people, understand their world, be in the online space where they are available and be a reliable source of guidance and support.

Introduce Jesus: Help young people develop a personal relationship with Jesus through Church teachings, and personal examples. Giving reasons for their faith and deliver it in the `language' they understand will help them grow in love with Jesus.

Self-Discovery: In their confusions and identity crisis, guide young people to explore their strengths, weaknesses, passions, and purpose to build a strong identity.

Active Participation: Encourage young people to use their talents to serve the Church and community, finding meaning and purpose. Youth can reach out to other youths in a better way. Utilise the services of youngsters in communicating to the new generation in novel ways and approaches.

Unique Mission: Help young people discover their life's calling, how they can uniquely contribute to the world based on their gifts. Once they have a strong conviction, they can give their life to it.

Spiritual Growth: Support young people's spiritual journey by providing resources and guidance to deepen their faith and live it daily.

The church must become the traveling companion of young people and journey with them as they grapple with the Good News and respond in discipleship.

The Catholic faith can help individuals find purpose in life, regardless of generational differences. The ultimate goal is to help the youth to grow in their love for God and for others, and to become active and faithful members of the Church and society. For this, we need to know the new generations and their world.

Savera THE POWER OF EMPATHY IN **CONVERSATION: SPEAKING THE TRUTH IN LOVE**

Most of our relationships are developed through effective communication, both verbal and nonverbal. We all like a person who can articulate their thoughts while understanding the feelings and emotions of others. We call them people with a Heart. Pope Francis speaks about "speaking with the heart" in his 57th World Day of Communication message. Empathy comes from the Heart. Brittanica defines empathy as "the feeling that you understand and share another person's experiences and emotions".

Empathy of a person finds its true meaning in his or her capacity to listen

to whom he or she converses. Only a true listener can be a good person; moreover, a true communicator. Listening doesn't mean that you accept all of what the other person says. Pope Francis says, "listening with an ear of the Heart" in his 56th World Day of Communication message. Listening is "the grammar of



communication and a condition for genuine dialogue."

Jesus is the perfect model for empowering others with his way of conversation. Throughout his life, Jesus was empathetic towards various types of people, whether sick or healthy, sinners or "good Samaritans," even to those who criticized Jesus. The narrative of the disciples who were going to Emmaus is the best example of the power of empathy in conversation. Jesus was accompanying them. He heard their fear, anguish, and felt with them "Jesus himself, drawing near, travelled with them". Lk 24:15. Jesus didn't make any accusations against their way of thought. Instead, he listened to them and began to converse with them from Scripture. Jesus'

conversation was from heart to heart so that they could experience the power of Jesus. The disciples finally experienced the power of sympathy in conversation, "Was not our heart burning within us, while he was speaking on the way, and when he opened the Scriptures to us?" Lk 24:32

Furthermore, empathy in conversation is cordiality. Pope Francis defines cordiality in communication as "Communicating in a cordial manner means that those who read or listen to us are led to welcome our participation in the joys, fears, hopes and suffering of the women and men of our time." (57th WDC) True communication is in the manner of dialogue, which means participatory communication. This is the Synodal way of journey.

Goodness comes from the heart, and it is a sign of empathy. Empathy is a state of mind where we see the other person as our own; it goes beyond sympathy "A good man, from the good storehouse of his heart, offers what is good. And an evil man, from the evil storehouse, offers what is evil. For out of the abundance of the heart, the mouth speaks" Lk 6:45. Goodness could be seen in a person where the gifts of the Holy Spirit are bloomed.

We are living in a world where we hear many hate speeches. The result is obvious: enmity and hatred. Conversations should lead to uplifting our minds from negative thoughts to positive aspirations, which means imparting empathy and peace to those who hear us. Twenty years ago, I was in a small town in Rajasthan, nestled in the hills, and the air was filled with the sweet fragrance of blooming flowers. I was in charge of the hostel of 480 boys and girls. The classes were up to 7^{th} standard. The children were from different villages, a bit shabby but very cute, and had a lot of hope and love in their eyes.

After a few months of being with the children and teaching them, I could recognize a girl named Kamla, one who was very different from the others. She hails from an interior village and her village was a place where everyone knew each other, and life followed the rhythm of nature and tradition. Her parents were farmers and she was the youngest among the three siblings. Despite their humble means, they valued education and the power it held to transform lives.

Kamla was a bright and curious child, always eager to learn and explore. Her parents, recognizing her potential, decided to send her to a boarding school in the nearby town. The school, Nirmala Niketan, was the first school and boarding by the SVDs. For Kamla, this meant leaving behind the familiar comforts of her village and embracing a world that was entirely different from what she had known.

She was good in her studies, shy in her approach, helping the small kids like a mother. Yet, she stood out among the girls not because of her circumstances but because of her unwavering faith and dedication. I could notice every morning, she could run to the grotto to just pray, seeking strength and guidance. Every evening, she used to lead the rosary. Her regularity in prayers and her quiet, serene nature earned her the respect of her peers and teachers alike.



Kamla's devotion did not go unnoticed.

I could see in her a rare blend of intelligence, humility, and deep spirituality. She excelled in her studies, after completing class 7 from Nirmla Niketan school, joined Government school in that town. Along with studies, her commitment to her faith only grew stronger.

MISSIONARY MANDATE: PROCLAMATION THROUGH WITNESS

The Catholic Church teaches that she is missionary by her very nature. It means that evangelization activity is something, that flows from the very nature of the Church herself. Evangelization is the essential mission of the Church. The concept of evangelization may be controversial in the Indian context. It is looked at with suspicion and equated with proselytization.

The purpose of this evangelization is described as "to make men share in the communion between the Father and the Son in their spirit of Love." The Church believes that the message and content of the evangelization is the Good News, the Word made flesh. It is pointing to Jesus Christ. People who proclaim it are only instruments in the hands of God.

Pope Francis breathed fresh air into the Church's missionary activities

through his First Apostolic Exhortation, Evangelii Gaudium translated as 'The Joy of the Gospel.' The Pope invites Christians to embark on the mission of evangelization with the joy of the Gospel. The essence of evangelization does not change and it still, is the proclamation of Christ. "The heart of its message will always be the same: the God who



revealed his immense love in the crucified and risen Christ."In fidelity to the teachings of Christ, the baptized have a duty to go and proclaim Christ. "All the baptized, whatever their position in the Church or their level of instruction in the faith, are agents of evangelization." The source and strength of evangelization is explained as going beyond oneself and sharing what a believer has received in baptism. It is this sharing that makes a person fully human. A dignified and fulfilling life is attained only when we reach out to others. Evangelization is not to be seen as an isolated individual activity, but rather a communitarian activity.

The mission is accepted by, every baptized Christian, but the mission is accomplished in a community. Therefore, communion and mission are interconnected. This communitarian aspect forces people, to get involved in the lives of people, by word and deed. Therefore, an evangelizing community is willing to abase itself to touch human life especially the suffering flesh of Christ. An evangelizing community is supportive and stands by people at every step of the way, no matter how lengthy or difficult it may be. Pope Francis, rightly uses the term 'evangelizers smell the sheep' to express the involvement of evangelizers in the daily lives of people.

It is an invitation to imitate Christ who 'knows his sheep.' Pope Francis expresses his dream of missionary evangelization where the missionary impulse would first take on the Church, transforming herself, its customs, and structures. He recommends, the cohesive and comprehensive sense of human life that the Gospel offers as the best remedy for all the ills of our cities. At the same time, 'a rigid and uniform program of evangelization' is not apt to face the multifaceted realities of cities. Therefore, the Pope exhorts, to face the challenges of the culture of cities with the leaven of the Gospel.

Mission in Indian Context

Kandhamal had become a synonym for communal carnage. Its land was soaked with the blood of scores of Christians massacred. Its horizon was blanketed with smoke smoldering from the houses and worshiping places of Christians which were set on fire; its air was filled with the venom of hatemongers of the Hindutva breed.

Fifteen years down the lane 35 stars are emerging, from the same place to brighten its gloomy sky. The announcement by the Vatican Congregation for the Cause of Saints granting permission for initiating the process of beatification of 35 martyrs of Kandhamal in Odisha, who gave up their lives for their faith during the 2008 anti-Christian riots, is nothing less than a miracle. From now on, they will be called the 'Servants of God' and it is the first step towards sainthood.

It is only on the rarest of the rare occasion that the Vatican gives its green signal for initiating the beatification of a group of persons. Some of the group's canonization in the past are the 120 martyr saints of China, 103 Korean martyrs, 117 Vietnamese martyrs, and French Revolutionary martyrs. It is of unprecedented significance that 34 of the 35 Kandhamal martyrs are lay people, the only other person being a priest. Among the lay people, 11 are women. India has hitherto got just one lay person saint in Devasahayam Pillai. This makes the Vatican announcement an epoch-making one.

The Church in Kandhamal is less than two centuries old. But the faith of the Christians there is deeper than the deepest seas and stronger than the strongest. The orgy of violence that hit Kandhamal put their faith to the test. The Hindutva goons put to use the most gruesome methods like beheading, strangulation, setting on fire, and many more cruel measures to break the back of their faith. Houses of umpteen Christians were vandalized; worshiping places were demolished; thousands were forced to leave their hearth and home and live in jungles for days together.

But, many of them like Kantheswar Digal, Fr. Bernard Digal, and 33 others, whose process of beatification is underway, preferred to give up their life rather than give up faith. Their faith in the Lord Jesus Christ could not be lessened even a bit by the most heinous and brutal attacks unleashed on them. This should be an eye-opener for those who boast of caste, rite, or similar mundane things as a yardstick of faith. We have a true example of an evangelized church in Kandhamal. The relatively young evangelized community has given to the

Indian Church a group of martyrs who shed their blood for Christ.

The message from the martyrs of Kandhamal is loud and clear in the context of challenges in evangelization in India. It is not only priests, nuns, and religious, but the lay people too can be on the way to becoming saints if their lives measure up to the Christian faith. It is, neither rituals and rubrics nor ceremonies and celebrations that make one truly Christian.

The unadulterated faith in Jesus Christ and observance of the core values He preached should be the soul of our Christian life. That is the message coming from the martyrs of Kandhamal. There is a message for the Church in India to focus on strengthening the faith of the people, rather than splitting its energy on amassing material possessions. The growth of the Church lies in strengthening its spiritual base, not enlarging its physical empire.

As the years passed, Kamla felt a growing call to serve God and humanity. After much contemplation, prayer, and guidance by the Parish Priest, she decided to join the convent after completing her education. Her decision was met with mixed reactions. Her family, though supportive, was saddened to see her leave a potential career in the world outside. Her friends admired her courage but couldn't fully understand her choice.

Kamla joined the Sisters Servants of the Holy Spirit (SSpS) after completing her class 10. The transition was not easy. The life of a nun was one of strict discipline, selflessness, and often, solitude. But for Kamla, it was a life filled with purpose and peace. She immersed herself in the daily routines of the convent, from early morning prayers to community service, always finding joy in the simplicity of her existence.

Her dream was realized when she made her first profession on 03 May 2013 and took her final profession on Perpetual vows on 25 July 2020. She is the first SSpS sister from Jhadol to become a missionary to Argentina. She furthered her education by completing her Master of Social Work (MSW) in Bhopal. Kamla, now Sister Kamla was commissioned to a mission in Argentina, a place far removed from the arid landscapes of Rajasthan after her final vows. The transition was daunting, but her faith was her anchor. She embraced her new role with grace, seeing it as a divine calling to bring hope and love to those in need across the world.

Sister Kamla's story became an inspiration to many. A small girl whom I saw 20 years ago is now commissioned to the mission. She is also an inspiration for the three those who followed her and became missionaries in the Holy Spirit (SSpS).

God Calls and commissions each and every time whenever it is needed. Sister Kamla's journey from a small village in Rajasthan to a mission in Argentina is a testament to the power of faith, education, and unwavering dedication. Commissioned by God to a global mission, her life of service, rooted in deep spirituality and compassion, continues to inspire and transform lives across continents.

March 2024, was in fact an unpretentious attempt to value women's inclusion in every sphere of life. While the world recognises the accomplishment of women in different fields of endeavour, whether national, ethnic, linguistic, religious, economic, political, etc., it is good to note that women are integrated into the life and Mission of the Church too, to a large extent.

The Synod of Synodality invites the Church to listen and discern, especially those on the Margins of the Church and Society. Pope Francis's specific intention for April 2024 states: "We pray that the dignity and immense value of women be recognized...." Such and various other attempts are tangible steps to be more inclusive, particularly concerning women. Pope Francis anticipates the whole church to be a participatory Church walking together in Communion and fraternity. Undeniably, Women Religious are appreciative of the Pope for his daring decision that allowed them to participate and vote in the Synod of Bishops on Synodality. Despite all the genuine efforts within the Church, there is still an urgent need to make sure that women are listened to, allowed to participate in decision-making processes, and take on roles of responsibility in Pastoral care and Ministry. God is the potter and we are the clay, being shaped into His likeness, day by day! Can we imagine a single day without a woman existing in this world, particularly in the Church? We cannot deny the fact that God has empowered woman with innate and instinctive qualities like responsibility, power, beauty, sacrifice, and so on.

Notwithstanding male dominance, women in the history of Christianity surpassed all societal expectations of Biblical times. I wish to have a glimpse into the life of a few exceptional women of the Bible who dared to speak, serve, lead, sing, prophecy, teach, and preach:

Mary of Nazareth: As the mother of Jesus, Mary's all-important role in the Bible goes without saying. After all, she was the one who gave birth to the world's saviour when she was just a teen, just as the angel Gabriel said she would. (Ref. Luke 1:26-33)

The Samaritan Woman: It's interesting that Christ allows the Samaritan Woman to share her testimony of their interaction. She was the first Samaritan to hear the good news, and the first to share that news with others. (Ref. Jn 4:4-26)

Mary Magdalene: Mary Magdalene was certainly a faithful follower of Jesus. After being healed by Him, she travelled with Him and witnessed his crucifixion, burial, and resurrection. (Ref. John 20:11-16)

Mary of Bethany: Mary always put Jesus first. While she was hosting Him at her home with Martha, He commended her for "choosing the better" by sitting at His feet. (Ref. Luke 10:38-42)

Martha: While Mary's sister Martha was chastised by Jesus for putting her hosting duties above learning Jesus' word, she was still a devoted follower who wanted Jesus to be comfortable and waited upon. (Ref. John 11:17-24) and also Sarah (Ref. Genesis 21:1-7) Ruth the Moabite (Ref. Ruth 2:10-13) Rachel (Ref. Genesis 30:17-24) Hannah (1 Samuel 1:24-28) Deborah (Ref. Judges 4:4-9) Esther (Ref. Esther 8:3-6) Miriam (Ref. Exodus 15:20-21) Hagar, Abigail, Jehosheba, Rahab, Bathsheba, etc. are a few more women who demonstrated faith in God and honoured God throughout their life.

St. Paul also mentions the names of those women who worked very hard and struggled with him in the cause of the gospel. Phoebe in Romans 16:1–2, Priscilla her husband Aquila in Romans 16:3–5, Mary in Romans 16:6, Junia in Romans 16:7, Chloe in 1 Corinthians 1:10–12, Euodia and Syntyche in Philippians 4:2–3, Nympha in Colossians 4:15, Lois and Eunice in 2 Timothy 1:5, Apphia in Philemon, etc.

I just want to respectfully think that God designed a different way for those women mentioned above and those countless women who emerge victorious day by day to know and experience the fullness of God.

The Great Commission

FOSTERING LOVE FOR SCRIPTURE IN FORMATION

There is a lovely quotation attributed to St Augustine which says: that **'The Sacred Scriptures are our letters**

from home'. Letters are tangible evidence that we are thought about, that we are cared for, that through them we are being gazed upon with love.

We are God's children and Scripture is the Word of God. God gave us the Bible so that, we could know how to be faithful to Him. God's Word gives us guidelines that are applicable regardless of time, place, or person. It can influence our daily lives, our self-worth, our relationships and so on. Remarkable are the ways of the Lord who works even through flawed, imperfect persons.

God's Word is alive and powerful. It is sharper than any double-edged sword. God's Word can cut through our spirits and souls, through our joints and marrow, and can discern reflections and thoughts of the heart (cf. Heb. 4:6). God's Word restores and heals. Reading and reflecting on the Bible regularly keeps us close to God. It also gives us wisdom, joy, and guidance.

The Bible is the ultimate source of truth, wisdom, and spiritual transformation. Focus on Bible knowledge and upright living remains essential for transformation.

We have many examples of Saints who were transformed with Scripture as the base. I quote St. Ignatius of Loyola who while recuperating when he was gravely wounded in a battle with the French experienced a conversion. Reading the lives of Jesus and the saints made Ignatius happy and aroused the desire to do great things. Ignatius realized that these feelings were clues to God's direction for him.

It is said that Ignatius often quoted this Bible verse to Francis: "What good is it for a man to gain the whole world if he loses his soul?" (Mt 16:26). To his Society of Jesus, Ignatius in turn directed to 'Go forth and set the world on fire.', 'Act as if everything depended on you; trust as if everything depended on God....'

Blessed Carlo Acutis is someone who showed us how to live according to the Holy Spirit and radiated the fruits of that life compellingly.

Scriptures, have helped me to form myself, especially, to focus on the centrality of God's **love** through Jesus and the process of being connected at a deeper level with God and with others. I learned to lean on God. No doubt, I fail...a LOT. I lose my temper. I don't always handle stress well. One may be tempted to ask – So, how can you guarantee fostering a love for Scripture in Formation stages? I must admit that although I am a lover of Scripture yet, falter with many failings as a human person. As a person, I might have failed but Jesus in His merciful love lifted me and assured me that I am being loved and

forgiven. The power of prayer with Scripture base and the Holy Spirit at work on my heart made all the difference.

I am aware that there is a **syllabus** in Formation stages on Scripture but fostering **Love** for Scripture is essential. The lives of the Formees are required to be shaped based on the Master - JESUS whom they wish to follow.

Paul emphasized the central role of Scripture in terms of both salvation and sanctification in 2 Timothy 3:14-17. The truth of God's Word marks lines of distinction so that our lives become meaningful and are united to one another in a community. If we do not know where to stand, how can we stand together? The perimeters of Scripture answer this question.

As Christians, if we submit to the authority of biblical truth, our hearts will be more conformed to Christ's image as witnesses. As true witnesses, we will yield the fruits of the Spirit rather than the works of the flesh in our lives (Gal. 5:16-26).

The Bible provides guidance and adds purpose to our lives:

- 1. The Bible tells us WHO we are: That we are children of God who have a tendency to sin but, we can be redeemed if we choose God and believe that Jesus died to save us.
- 2. Bible Tells us WHAT to do (In Principle): Although the culture was vastly different at the time the Bible was written, yet, humanity is dealing with the same struggles that persist today: pride, greed, guilt, hate, fear, etc.
- **3.** The Bible tells us WHY we should do what it says: The Bible says in multiple places that those who believe in God and strive to do His will are given eternal life (Cf. Rom. 10: 9-20; Jn. 5: 24). There is no promise of a perfect life, the lessons in the Bible are meant for my benefit. That is why Jesus said, "...I have come that they may have life and that they may have it more abundantly" (Jn. 10:10).
- 4. The Bible tells us HOW to do what it says: God offers the fruits of His Spirit—love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (Cf. Gal. 4: 22-23)—to those who choose Him daily. CHISDA MISSION


Rev. Sr. Anna Rosaria sfn For the last three decades, the Holy Family Sisters had been rendering services in the Union Territory of Dadra and Nagar Haveli in the Mission of Daman at Our Lady of Lourdes Mission Chisda, since 4 June 1994.

Chisda is nestled in the evergreen forest situated in the South west of Daman, Dadra Nagar Haveli. Our sisters came here in response to the call of Pilar fathers "in the spirit of our Founder, to serve the poor and to work for the integral development of these people".

Chisda is a mosaic of primitive culture, idol-worship and utter poverty. The tribals speak either Marathi or the Warli dialect. They would move about in sparse clothing but now have changed a lot. Their houses are made of mud walls and low roofs of thatched jowar and wild plants. Their staple food is ragi, potatoes and jowar bhakri. They cook their food in earthenwares. There is paucity of water in this place with only a small pond

in the vicinity. The water is polluted as the inhabitants wash their clothes and themselves together with their cattle- goats and bullocks in the same water.

Most of the tribals are non-Christians. The few who are Catholics are for name's sake. They look for material gain from the local



Our sisters visit the families in pairs or with a priest. They share their simple reflections on the Word of God with the people, pray spontaneously with them, and listen to their economic, social and health problems. These home visits are done on foot. Some families are about 5 to 10 km apart. The sisters visit them. Poor as they are, the Warlis have a loving and generous heart. They will offer you at least an egg when you visit them. The sisters also cater to teaching the children and conduct Mother and Child Health Programmes (MCH) as well as Mahila Mandals.

It is a challenging task and missionary in every aspect, where much still needs to be done. Yet the smoky hills, the mighty trees, the chirping of the birds and the mooing of the buffaloes God for His infinite love and care.





Health EMERGANCY MANGEMENT

EMERGANCY MEDICINE IS A MEDICAL SPECIALTY THAT EQUIPS DOCTORS AND GENERAL PUBLIC WITH THE KNOWLEDGE AND

SKILLS REQUIRED TO CARE FOR PEOPLE WITH LIFE-THREATENING OR URGENT HEALTH CARE NEEDS.

DIVIDED INTO TWO CATEGORIES. ACLS (ADVANCED CARDIAC LIFE SUPPORT) AND BLS (BASIC LIFE SUPPORT)

BASIC LIFE SUPPORT CAN BE PERFORMED BY GENERAL PUBLIC WITH SOME BASIC KNOWLEDGE. IT INCLUDES EARLY RECOGNITION OF EMERGANCY LIFE THREATENING CONDITION AND ACTING UPON ACCORDINGLY.

- Step 1: Check for responsiveness: Before providing BLS, check to see if the person is responsive by tapping their shoulder and asking if they are okay. If the person is unresponsive, shout for help and begin BLS immediately.
- Step 2: Call for emergency medical services (EMS): If the person is unresponsive, call your local emergency number for EMS. If possible, have someone else make the call while you begin BLS.
- Step 3: Begin chest compressions: Position yourself with the person on a hard, flat surface and kneel beside them. Place the heel of one hand on the center of the person's chest (between the nipples), and place the heel of your other hand on top of the first hand. Keep your fingers off the person's chest. Push down on the person's chest, compressing it to a depth of about 2 inches (5 centimeters) at a rate of 100 to 120 compressions per minute.
- Step 4: Provide rescue breaths: After 30 chest compressions, open the person's airway by tilting their head back and lifting their chin. Pinch their nose shut and give two breaths into their mouth, making sure their chest rises.
- Step 5: Continue CPR: After giving two breaths, return to chest compressions and repeat the cycle of 30 compressions and 2 breaths until professional help arrives, or until the person starts to breathe and show signs of life, or until you feel too tired to continue

ACLS (ADVANCED CARDIAC LIFE SUPPORT)

It is to be performed by trained medical doctor or medical staff. After medical aid has arrived.

It includes of giving high quality crp and use oxygen, cardiac monitors and aed (automated external defibrillator).
